
We are looking for district officers and for churches to host our 2024 Spring and Annual Gatherings. If you or your unit can do either, please contact me!

FUNDRAISING IDEA

The Holiday Bazaar is held from 9am-2pm on the Saturday before Thanksgiving each year at **The Well, A United Methodist Church in Rosemount.**



<u>Pickled Beets</u> have been a successful sale item for many years. We use a recipe from one of the UMW members in 2006.

The beets (3 five-gallon pails) are purchased from a local Farmers Market and are refrigerated after purchase. The pickles are made in the church kitchen and processed via the Hot Water Bath method. Three ladies come in around 7am to wash and cook the beets for about one hour. Other helpers come to peel, slice,

pack in jars, make the brine, and process the beets using the hot water bath method. Clean up is usually finished before 1pm. The processed jars are left on towels on the kitchen counter to cool for 24 hours. The brine uses packages of "Pickling Spice" found in the bulk spice section at Cub Foods. In the past one batch of brine was needed for 14 widemouth pint jars. Seventy-two wide mouth pints were sold out in 2022. They sold for \$5.00 a pint. The jars and rings were asked to be returned, which helps keep the cost down; it may be increased this year.

Jalapeno Jelly was first made by one lady (a dozen jars) using the recipe in the CERTO box. It was so popular that



now we make 6 batches at church. For the **Raspberry Jalapeno Jam**, we use the regular Sure Jell cooked method with raspberries donated by members. It takes 3 cups of mashed raspberries per batch; the yield is 9 half pints per batch.

We also use the hot water bath method to make half pints of <u>Colorado Peach Jam</u> and <u>Crab Apple Butter</u>. We also make stewed tomatoes, which we label as <u>Chili Starter</u>, although they take longer to process since some are pints and some are quarts. Two ladies also make <u>Salsa</u> at home, and it sells well, too.

Purchase the vegetables at your local Farmers Market. Provide samples for tasting on a cracker, served by one person with a nitrile glove the first year. Avery Sticky Labels are used for each product, sample available. Request that jars and unrusted rings be returned to your church when possible. Directions with photos are available by contacting me:



How often do we "pray" the Lord's Prayer in church or other gatherings by simply repeating



considering the meaning and the power of what we say? This year's Mission u study focused on the importance of the prayer, by looking at every phrase and challenging us to consider how the prayer can guide us to become the reflection of God's love in His Kin-dom.

Held at Motley UMC in Motley, MN, Mission u in person was a time of learning, sharing, and meditating. The study book, *Living the Kin-dom*, focuses on the Lord's Prayer by breaking the prayer into eight phrases that can be studied and discussed. Leaders Marion Hansen and Elizabeth Everitt provided insight and asked questions to provoke discussion. The last session encouraged us to consider what we can do to shift our focus from a culture of exploitation and oppression (kingdom) to one of community building (Kin-dom).

Break times provided opportunities for quiet reflection in the meditation room, set up by Janet Ewing; for doing puzzles and crafts, planned by Linda Kotschevar; and, of course, enjoying snacks and drinks courtesy of Motley

Hello to everyone—my notes today will be short, but they will give you an update on happenings at the state legislature of which JRLC (Joint Religious Legislative Coalition) was involved.

1. Sacred Settlements—Passed.

Provides faith congregations with a way to provide permanent housing and a support system to people transitioning out of chronic homelessness. This passed bill defined building standards for congregations and inspection criteria for city governments.

2. Childcare Assistance Program—Passed

Raised reimbursement rates for CCAP from the 30th percentile of market rate to the 75th percentile. 75th percentile reimbursement rate is the federal standard.

3. Early Childhood Programs—Passed.

Supported parent-centered approaches to investing in early childhood programs for low-income families. Increased funding for early childhood scholarships.

4. Emergency Shelter and Housing—Passed.

\$137 million in dedicated funding for Emergency shelters.

5. <u>Pending</u>—Maternal death research expansion

It was a busy legislative year, and we can pray that future legislation will continue to work toward ways to support low-income persons including women and children.



In a recent survey of 2,000 U.S. respondents:

- ♦ 56% of adults admit to reading at least one "serious" book in the summer "to look smarter".
- 36% use the summer months to brush up on their knowledge of history
- 2 out of 5 read more mysteries during vacation than they do at any other point of the year



- ◆ More than half the poll (53%) looks forward to romantic reads on their holiday break —
 including, surprisingly, more men than women (56% vs 37%)
- Men are also more likely to admit they use the summer to read books they like without fear of judgment (73% vs 62%).
- The study also reveals that while summer is the biggest season of reading, nearly half of the respondents are planning to add an extra half hour of weekly reading this fall.

Whether you read paperbacks, hard cover books, use e-readers, or listen to taped books, United Women in Faith encourages each of us to **join the UWF Reading Program** to stay current in our knowledge of today's issues, and to continue to be women of action.

EMMA NORTON SERVICES:

A lot is happening at Emma Norton Services these days, and our River Valley District involvement and commitment is more important than ever.

Restoring Waters. First and foremost is the 2024 opening of the new Restoring Waters Residence in the Highland Bridge area of St. Paul. The building is well underway with construction on track to be completed next spring. After nearly ten years of visioning and planning, it is exciting to see this project come to fruition. The Residence will replace the very worn building on Robert Street and have 60 individual units for women and small families. It will also house the offices for ENS. The new facility will provide transformative housing coupled with supportive services that will help the residents recover from trauma and empower them to achieve their individual goals.

<u>Capital Campaign.</u> Restoring Waters is being developed in partnership with Project for Pride in Living, Urban Works, and Ryan Companies. However, a vital piece of the funding comes from the Capital Campaign, *Home + Healing*, now underway. The campaign's goal is \$3.75 million, with one million coming from faith partners—United Women in Faith, the United Methodist Church, and other faith-based organizations and individuals. About half of that amount has been raised to date; the aim is to raise the remainder by the time the building is completed. This campaign provides an opportunity for each River Valley UWF unit to get involved. Please consider planning a special drive or fund-raiser to make a gift on behalf of your chapter and be part of this important mission. Individual gifts are equally appreciated. <u>Opening Doors Gala</u>. While Restoring Waters is the big news at ENS, there is lots going on in other areas too. The annual Opening Doors Gala held in late April was very successful. ENS raised almost \$130,000 at the event, which was attended by about 250 people. Many of you, either individually or through your UWF chapters, contributed to its success by providing creative gift baskets or other auction items or making a financial gift. Thank you!

The townhomes at Emma's Place continue to house up to 13 families, with staff providing creative programming for the children and youth. The Community Building will be getting a much-needed refresh in the next couple of months.

<u>Opportunities to Serve</u>. If your unit is close enough to St. Paul to make travel feasible, please consider hosting one of the monthly Bingo Parties or another social event for the residents—a holiday themed party, a craft session, etc. The women are so appreciative. Please continue if you can.

Super absorbency tampons

PAST Unit Highlights from UWFs in our district



Here are a few histories taken from the RV UMW Histories Binder. These were collected in 2010 & 2011 by the UMW Historian at the time, Joy Johnson.



Lydia Zion UMW—Jordan, MN

The women's group has always been an important part of the Lydia Zion UMC since it was founded 153 years ago. They were dedicated to raising money for missions and the improvement of the church building. mostly the kitchen. The first organized women's group that we know of was organized in 1890 by Mrs. H.H. (Eleanor) Hines. It was called the Frauen Auswertege Mission Verlin or the Women's Foreign Missionary Society. These ladies gave 2¢ a week for Missions. They put on box lunch socials, fancy work sales, ice cream socials, apron sales and chicken suppers to raise money. These suppers were no small feat as the church did not have a kitchen. Suppers and socials were held at the Gelack Hall in Lydia. All the water and food and everything else had to be hauled up and down the stairs. Things improved in 1937 when the basement was excavated and a kitchen was built. The Lydia Ladies became famous for putting on a wonderful turkey dinner each year. The turkeys and dressing were roasted by a baker in Shakopee but all else was homemade. The potatoes peeled and mashed by hand, kept warm in a crock sitting in a washtub of hot water, covered with a rag rug. The egg coffee, wonderful gravy and flaky pies all served family style brought in the crowds. So many bowls and serving pieces to wash and no dishwasher as we have now. In 1977 we served 896 dinners priced at \$3 each for adults and \$1.50 for children. We all think that must have been an error as we now serve around 500 dinners. The dinner discontinued in 1981 as it was too hard to put on. We started to dinner again in 1998.

The UMW has sponsored many events and raised a lot of money for missions and local church improvements. We have organized Mother Daughter banquets, Christmas Brunches, Pancake Breakfasts,

Tupperware and Pampered Chef parties, Silent Auctions, the Turkey Dinner, and all those potlucks. We have served lunch at countless funerals, hoping to ease the sorrow of the family involved. So many egg salad and ham sandwiches and yummy cakes. Giving to missions became much more personal when we helped raise money to send groups from our church to Honduras on mission trips.

Currently the UMW supports the River Valley District UMW, Emma Norton Residence, The Simpson Shelter, Alpha Pregnancy Center, The Cap Agency and The Union Gospel Mission.

We have a rich history and have been so blessed to be able to use our time and energy to serve God.

McKinley UMW—Winona, MN

Date of 1st UMW-WSCS was September 18, 1940 at 2:30pm. 84 women attended.

Our early chicken pie suppers were famous. Can you imagine us today plucking and drawing 100-125 chickens as they did for those suppers—no way—we are too busy working. However, if anyone is so inclined, my husband has a good system that works our for killing chickens fast—like his mother—ringing their necks. Chickens were all over the neighborhood!! OR...

By no means were these women just work-horses. The old records tell of some very interesting and fun meetings. Some of them organized a kitchen band which became quite renowned and so good and funny they were often invited to other church societies to play. No wonder that one woman had much a stern mouth—she was the tuba player.

South Ridge UMW—La Crescent, MN

In 1908 the Ladies Aid Society of the Tabor Church, of the Evangelical Association, later changed to South Ridge, was organized. The object of the society was for raising money to assist in defraying expenses of the local church. Rev. Zick was against the organization because he thought the women would become less spiritual if they become part of the fund raising. They organized anyway!!!!!

Any lady of good standing could become a member. If she missed a meeting for any reason, other than illness, she was fined 10ϕ . Refreshments were served for 10ϕ .

In 1943 the Women's Missionary Society (WMS) was formed. The dues then became 25¢. A great emphasis was placed on missionaries. It was decided to hold meetings the first Thursday of each month, which we still do. In 1946 it was changed to Women's Society of World Service, then in 1968 to Women's Society of Christian Service and in 1972 to (UMW) United Methodist Women.

We provide cakes and serve a local nursing home. We help support Camp Winnebago for handicap people, various missions, goodie boxes at Christmas, make kits for UMCOR, give to 2 After Prom Parties, and purchase items for the church and kitchen.

For over 80 years we have had an annual Harvest Festival. In 2005 we sold over 500 cookbooks, "Treasures of Heaven".

South Ridge U.M. Church 1781 Chicken Ridge Rd., La Crescent, MN 55947

Harmony State Line UMW--Harmony, MN

The first records available of the Methodist Ladies Aid Society are under the date of 1904. Prior to 1915 the society meetings were held in home of our members who did quilting, sewing and various other projects. In 1940, this society was re-organized as the Women's Society of Christian

Service. They donated \$1,050 to complete the re-decoration of the church. A sum of \$1,000 was given towards the purchase of an electric organ. The earliest President on record was 1950-1951 who was Lois Starz. No mention of dues was recorded other than a basket passed at each meeting and still is today.

The First Annual May Fair of the WSCS was held in the church in 1950. A total of \$400 was raised, and now it is about \$1,500.

Every year we have sent our Pledge to Missions and our Pledge to Emma Norton. We are a 5 Star Unit and a Mission Today Unit. We also give all Channels of Undesignated Giving.

One of the early community projects was alternating with other churches in the community, serving monthly suppers. Some of the other activities include: participating in the Meals-on-Wheels program, Guest Breakfast, now known as Autumn Breakfast, Apple Fest, Christmas in Fillmore County, supplies for Emma Norton, school supplies and health kits for UMCOR and O.C. Ministries, Food Shelf, Salad Luncheon, sending clothing and Christmas gifts to Appalachia, sewing uniforms for Sierra Leone, donation to Southside Coalition, Church Women United, \$1,000 yearly to the church budget, and serving Fellowship Coffee after services. In 1985 we published a recipe cookbook. In the past we have given to Red Bird Mission in Kentucky.

Our UMW has always been represented at the School of Missions and also at District Meetings. We honor our confirmands and graduates with a tea and a gift, also our wedding couples. We take our turn in the community by hosting World Day of Prayer and serving at the Nursing Home about 7 times a year and for funerals.

We are in the process of making a UMW Friendship Quilt/Wall hanging.
